




Jurisdiction of Survey Respondents

At the Time They Converted



Location of Respondent's Parish at Conversion 45 States in All




Almost Half Converted ~Since Pandemic Began





Male % Increasing


Gender vs. Conversion Period






Many Young Persons

Under 40 = 78% men





Marital Status of Respondents



Education Level at Conversion




Number of Previous Religion Switches Before Becoming Orthodox

What Attracted You

- "I wanted a faith that intruded into my daily life, & would be a visible presence every day of the year, not just Sundays; I wanted to deepen & grow in my faith... the (protestant) church just couldn't provide that for me."
- "...allowed God to be God and for things to "not make sense"
- "does not have the tendency to over define every single thing to finest possible detail... simply allows Mystery to be Mystery"
- "Willing to admit when things are not knowable"



What Attracted You

- "(Orthodoxy) focused on resurrection & forgiveness, not just sin"
- "I was missing a sense of the sacred"
- "Other faiths felt shallow and malnourished."
- "My (protestant) faith felt like dipping my finger in a lukewarm bowl of water. Orthodoxy felt like reaching my arm into a pool to find out how deep it goes and finding myself falling headfirst into unknown, infinite depths."




What Attracted You

- "...didn't feel like a **spectator** anymore"

- "It's not trying to entertain me"




Elements of the Orthodoxy that were Most Difficult for You?





I do not follow him anymore, and honestly hope that the clergy clamp down on online apologists."




More 'Influencer' Comments (Pro/Con)

(and more later)

- "speaking about Christ with my friend & he asked me if I knew about Orthodoxy. When I said that I didn't, he linked me Dyer's channel... after I watched his **video refuting Protestantism**, decided to check out my nearest Orthodox church and that led me on the path to my conversion. Before that, I had never entertained a single thought of converting from Baptist Christianity."
- "Dyer introduced me to Orthodoxy...saw interview on YT channel on Technocracy. I thought he was handsome and very intelligent."
- "Came across debate by Jay Dyer... against Muslim scholars that helped me a lot" (respondent formerly Muslim)
- "YouTube personalities cause(d) rigorist trends made me hesitate in converting"
- "Started with Jordan Peterson, then Johnathan Pageau, then to Ancient Faith podcasts like Lord of Spirits"
- "I find a lot of AFR programming off-putting. It feels like Protestant mega-church, cult of personality, programming."
- "Watched a video ... to get talking points for the side of Protestantism against Ortho leaning friends. Came away realizing I was the wrong one."
- "I grew up in many places of the world, and always seemed to encounter at least 1 Orthodox Christian wherever I went.... they had all been reference points for me that I looked back on."

Positive Parish Characteristics

Most often mentioned attributes by converts after 2019:

- 1. English
- 2. Proximity
- Priest knowledgeable, good teacher; no pressure; good example; dedicated; trustworthy
- 4. People: friendly welcoming; encouraging; active parish life; find a friend; my age
- 5. Children welcomed; many; church school
- 6. Diversity (or lack): some want diversity; others like mostly young /mostly converts
- 7. Non-ethnic
- 8. Music –decent (or better); participative
- 9. Church beauty; iconography
- 10. Array of services; # of services
- 11. Size —more mentioned small than large







Parish Selection Quotes

- "Women dress modestly & a majority wear **head coverings**. I feel that I attend a parish where people take their faith seriously." (female)
- "...good priest who's not an **ecumenist or modernist**"...
- "priest who doesn't believe in ecumenism or anything 'woke'"
- "Old calendar, single spoon, no masks"
- □ (Parish) "has many converts like me who left some of the same megachurches I'd attended."
- "I came for theological and philosophical reasons. I have fallen in love with the people"
- "being around cradles is helpful for my spiritual growth"
- (Ethnic parish) "it's not my culture; I don't know the dances or the food"
- (chosen parish) "felt uniquely 'American'



Parish Selection Quotes

- "A parish that notices when you step through the door is a truly blessed one. ...(they) include inquirers/ catechumens in activitiesthey love each other, you can feel it."
- "display/practice traits of true Christians"
- "I never once attended a service without people bringing me blessed bread. I LOVED THAT!"
- "If someone sitting near us shared antidoron with us, that was a particularly friendly parish."
- "numerous worship opportunities... important to me as I have great need for spiritual growth."
- "attracted by excellent choir...members sing during liturgy, instead of remaining silent"
- "accepting of young children being present during the Liturgy"
- "vibrant, intellectual adult education/discussion community"
- "Is this a place where 1 or 2 people do everything or are responsibilities more spread out?"

- 1. Ethnic/Insular elements of parishes
- 2. Parish size/Parish/Parishioner Qualities
- 3. Covid issues/Reactions
- 4. Toxic Orthodox social media environment; Overly zealous "online Orthodox".
- 5. Liberal ideas in the Church; "Creeping secular liberalism"
- 6. Doctrinal confusion/guidance






Ethnic/Insularity Turnoffs

- "Orthodox people (generally) tend to be colder and more aloof than anything I experienced as an Evangelical."
- "[ethnic group] women making the comment that, 'the converts are changing the culture of OUR church' - a huge turnoff."
- "[ethnic parish] can be cold towards converts versus the warm Protestant environment I was used to. I still hear negative terms used of converts."
- "No one spoke to me... priest seemed to be bothered that I wasn't [ethnic group]..."

- "I attended the local [ethnic jurisdiction] parish for more than a year, but they decided they didn't want to baptize or chrismate anyone who wasn't marrying into a [ethnic] family & suggested all of us non-[ethnic group people] go back to our American churches"
- "Welcomed with 'Why you here?' you [ethnic group]?
 You husband- he [ethnic group]?"
- "[Ethnic] parishes... such as Greek, Russian, etc. seem to feel exclusive and focus on their ethnicity more than being a Christian."
- "sentiment was I didn't need to be Orthodox because I was not [ethnic] and should go back to Evangelical church after spending my money at their festivals."

Parish size/Parish/Parishioner Qualities Turnoffs

- "it wasn't easy for me to be somewhere that you're instantly noticed. Even though some parishioners greeted me... it was quite some time before I had the courage to start coming to coffee hour."
- "median age in parish is quite old"
- "Parish communication not always up to date" (e.g. bible study canceled; no message/website info)
- "Sunday School curriculum not well organized"
- "Lack of evangelism"
- "there are times I wish our parish was larger"

Parish size/Parish/Parishioner Qualities Turnoffs

- "been an adjustment to not jump into ministries immediately upon joining the church. The non-denominational church really moves people into programs quickly; doesn't take time to acclimate and disciple people"
- "Male-only leadership and limits on what lay people could do in worship were hard since I was used to leading worship and preaching in my previous church"
- "(Cradles) who didn't take their faith seriously disturbed me... a lazy faith can be a turn off for new people."
- "Lack of understanding and appreciation of their faith amongst many cradle Orthodox"
- "many people didn't know why they said or did what they did...they just did."
- "Sometimes I felt **talked down to by men in their 20s and 30s** (roughly my age range), especially men who were converts."



Toxic Orthodox Social Media Environment

Turnoffs

46

- "(Based on) online community... I thought all Orthodox were bloodthirsty people who only cared for debating."
- "toxic, legalistic culture, casual bigotry toward Jewish and LGBT individuals, & conspiracy theories"
- "felt like the Orthodox version of "Lord of the flies", a lot of unsupervised, macho energy"
- "a cesspool of culture war sniping, racism, hatred, betrays a completely blind adherence to the modern need for 'certainty'....had I approached Orthodoxy from another vantage point they could have very well scared me off entirely"
- "Oftentimes, it feels as though people want more to defeat an enemy than to win a brother. This spirit is, I believe, keeping many Catholics, and Protestants from seriously looking at Orthodoxy."
- "To me much [online discourse] seems to be more **informed by fundamental Protestantism** than Orthodoxy."
- "People that, for whatever reason, view the Church as a place where they're allowed to be hostile to LGBTQ people, left-wing people, or people outside a particular ethnic group. Thankfully, I've not experienced that from church members who stay through the process."

Surprises/Disappointments

Youth/Children

- "Disappointed by lack of youth services in the OCA; need more support from OCA for parishes trying to establish youth ministry."
- "Happily surprised at how much my children have absorbed from being in the services...they burst into hymns spontaneously at home."

Disunity

- "Orthodoxy in America is so fractured"
- "My bishop is 16 hours away and the 2 other churches in my city are not under the same management"



Surprises/Disappointments

- Evangelism/Mission Lacking
 - "need greater emphasis on bringing NEW people into Church."
 - "lack of wanting to evangelize & share the faith from people who have been Orthodox their entire lives"
 - "(why do some) attack online Orthodox channels that open the door to the now secular western world to the Orthodox Faith?"
- Women
 - "Glad our parish includes girls in the service with holding candles"
 - "Lack of ministries and fellowship for women"
 - "Why we don't have female deacons (as the Church once did!)" but also...
 - "why women are not more persuaded to wear a veil."



Surprises/Disappointments

- Music/ Singing
 - "New priest said that we **shouldn't sing along with the choir** unless you are in the choir"
 - "I miss people singing in worship. Protestants sing like their salvation depends on it."
 - "(Why doesn't) Orthodox church "keep up with the times" and be culturally relevant in their worship music."



Liberal ideas in the Church; "Creeping secular liberalism" *Turnoffs*

- Too Liberal...dislike...
 - "attempts at 'modernization' and 'making relevant' of the Faith."
 - "endorsement of the Panheresy of ecumenism."
 - "people who want to drag it down the same paths that led to the destruction of the Western denominations"
 - "tolerance of envelopepushers in academic/theological circles...the episcopal failure to discipline/censure is a great disappointment"

- On the other hand... dislike...
 - "a need to always set Orthodoxy as in opposition to 'the west' to the point that if a western person says "the sky is blue" we must say it's green so as not to be western."
 - "Simplistic fundamentalism... priests muddling about in minor matters rather than present the rich treasures of the Church, decrying anything they don't like as 'modern/western'."
 - "We're increasingly presented with two alternatives **liberalization** akin to what occurred in mainline Protestantism **or rigorism** that robs its adherents of the easy yoke that comes with following Christ."
 - "correlation between traditional, liturgical worship, and social and political conservatism. People of all political persuasions can, and are, strongly attracted to Orthodox worship."

Convert Profile

- Serious about Faith
 - Not Orthodoxy lite; OINO (Orthodox in Name Only)
 - Looking for 'meaning'
 - Not all are looking for a friend
 - Akathists vs. Golf tourneys
 - Can lead to: "ultra"/hyperdoxy/emphasis on "exotic" (differentness); freezing everything
- Demographics
 - Male; Young
 - Many: socially (often politically) conservative
 - Most already Christian (to some degree)

- Many arrival paths; invitation; reading; internet/influencers (all)
- Attracted to:
 - Apostolic; Authentic; Historical;
 Continuity Unchanged; Stability;
 Fullness
 - Active, participative worship, English; Beauty
- Fleeing
 - Shallow; doctrinal/social innovation
- Difficulties
 - Families; friends



Why the Significant Number? Why Now

- General religious "churn"
- Pandemic
 - □ Time,
 - Consider deeper 'life questions'
 - Disconnect from current tradition/relationships
- Dissatisfaction with current tradition
 - Denominational issues
 - Creeping secularism
 - Theological 'shallowness
- Internet
 - Streaming; improved websites
 - Podcasts & influencer/persuaders
 - Word of mouth accelerated/intensified via social media



Why Some Parishes Not Others?

- Local demographics: age; people moving in/out
- Nobody likes an empty restaurant (church)
 - Concentrate on the "food"
- Converts beget converts; –inviting virtuous cycle.
- There are seekers near you!
 - Help them find you and don't act surprised!





Recommended Actions

- Come to Church
- Worship warmly and well
- Build awareness
- "Identify" as an Orthodox Christian
- Be welcoming & understanding
- Be able to answer a few questions
- Integrate newcomers

A Good Parish Discussion Question(s)

- What fundamental changes would be needed in our parish to strengthen our ability to attract inquirers looking for Jesus Christ and develop them into catechumens, converts and productive members of the Body of Christ?
 - Changes to:
 - Mindset/ attitude
 - Parish practices
 - How to do that?



"The greatest asset in the church is that we love one another. However, I have likewise seen that the greatest weakness in the church, with regard to growth, is that we love one another, but *only* one another. It is next to impossible to grow the church without loving those outside the church. Without love, the virtues of prudence, temperance, courage, justice, even, faith and hope become no more than the laws of man, godless rules by which we attempt and fail to live. Therefore, remember: 'The greatest of these is love' (1 Cor. 13:13)."
